In Seagulls our priority focus for learning is Communication and PSHE. Throughout the school day pupils have a range of opportunities to develop and gain new skills within these key areas and we recognise how important this is, particularly in preparing them for later on in life. A great time to facilitate this learning is during snack and dinner times where there are opportunities galore. Pupils are supported and encouraged to make and communicate their choices using a range of methods, e.g. speech, signs, photos, symbols and communications books to be as independent as possible. We promote opportunities for pupils to do things for themselves, e.g. use both a spoon and a fork together, to problem solve e.g. request the correct cutlery needed for dinner or pudding and ask for help if they need a wrapper or crisp packet opened.






A Fabulous Sports Day!

They then visited their local supermarket with shopping lists to purchase their picnics and pack their bags.



The summer holidays are nearly upon us. Below are some signs and symbols that you can use to give your child information about the holidays. When the holidays begin, you can sign or present the symbol to your child to tell them that there is 'no school' today or they are going to 'holiday club' or you're going on 'holiday'.



Summer Holiday Calendars Available!

If your child gains information from symbols, you can request one of our Summer Holiday Calendars. You will get 3 sheets of paper. One is the base sheet with a calendar layout of the holidays. The second sheets are for you to cut up and blu-tac on each day with your child. In the mornings you can look at the calendar with your child, say what the day and date is, point to it on the calendar then stick the appropriate symbol for the day on that date i.e. no school, holiday club or holiday (if you're going on holiday). Just pop a note in your child's home/school book to request a copy.
