Find my Past updates

Cincinnati (USA) Roman Catholic Parish Records - Over 644,000 new Cincinnati records have been added to the Catholic Heritage Archive.

Kent Burials - Over 4,500 records of burials that took place at St Martin's church in Cheriton are now available. These new additions cover two periods, 1843 to 1855 and 1907 to 1958.

Derbyshire Births and Baptisms - Just under a thousand additional records from 15 non-conformist parishes have been added mainly covering Methodists, Baptists, and Presbyterians.

Huddersfield Baptisms - Over 52,000 records covering 14 new parishes have been added.

Yorkshire Memorial Inscriptions - Over 5000 additional records covering 14 Anglican churchyards across the York area (West Riding, North Riding and Ainsty) Middlesex Baptisms - Over 64,000 new records added.





It appears that Find my Past is now in partnership with the "Billion Graves" website, so they are currently adding the millions of records to their website and as such they will be free to view (if you have a subscription to FindmyPast or alternatively, visit the library and use their facilities. You can use the library computers any time or on our research evenings.

Cemetery Symbols – Angels

Angels signify that the departed has taken flight into heaven. Some angels are weeping with wings that droop in sadness, denoting sorrow and lamentation. Others are in flight with a trumpet to proclaiming the gospel to the whole world. Some are walking upright, ready to escort the deceased into heaven.

Sometimes specific angels can be seen in cemeteries, such as St. George from an 11th-century legend, who rescued a princess from a dragon that required human sacrifices. Another is St. Michael with his drawn sword, engaged in the war in heaven against Lucifer.

In older Jewish cemeteries angels were forbidden, as were depictions of human faces. This was in conformity with one of the 10 Commandments, in an effort to thwart anyone from worshipping graven images. In later years, angels were allowed on gravestones if their faces were covered by their hands or arms.
