I would like to extend my deepest thanks to Tom Floyd, who retired as Chairman last summer, for his commitment and dedication to the Foundation over the last nine years and I am also extremely grateful to the Board of Trustees who play such an important role in taking the Foundation forwards, led by our new Chairman, Jonathan Cheshire OBE.

Finally, I offer my heartfelt thanks to all of our fund holders and donors who have so kindly supported our work to help vulnerable and disadvantaged people across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight and I look forward to working together again soon.

Chairman's Report

It is with great pleasure that I present my first report as Chairman, and I am pleased to confirm that it has been another successful year for HIWCF, with our endowment funds growing to £12.7 million, ensuring that those in need in our communities will benefit for years to come.

During 2017 we focused on the 'Solent Community Grants Programme' supporting inactive and unemployed people to overcome the barriers faced in moving closer or into employment. We also ran two themes for 'Youth Mental Health' aiming to help younger people deal with and prevent mental health issues, and 'Small Grants for Small Items' enabling community groups to purchase smaller essential items that are essential to their existence.

Our grant making focuses on supporting the pockets of deprivation that exist in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, with the Foundation awarding grants of over £8.8 million since 2006. Last year grants totalling £1,188,451 were awarded to the smaller charities and voluntary groups carrying out their vital work in local communities.

Our first thanks go to Tom Flovd who retired last year as Chairman of the Foundation. During Tom's tenure the Foundation grew dramatically with endowment funds increasing by over £7 million. Tom has done a tremendous job on behalf of the Foundation and I look forward to continuing to build on his commitment and input. Our thanks also go to Michael Woodhall who retired from the Board of Trustees in May. Michael has been a real advocate for the Foundation and we send him our best wishes for the future. Finally, we welcome Andrew Joy to the Board, Andrew brings with him a wealth of experience and knowledge which will be invaluable to us.

We do hope our Annual Review gives you a small insight into the work of HIWCF. Our work is only made possible thanks to the generosity of



our fund holders and donors and over the coming year we will be challenging the people and businesses of Hampshire and the Isle of Wight to join us in building new endowment funds providing a legacy for those in need in our communities.

Highlights 2017

This year has been busier than ever for the Foundation, with fund holders setting up new endowment funds of over £730,000 and providing new flow-through funds of over £830,000 to support our local voluntary and community groups.

- As part of the UKCF network, we celebrated reaching the milestone of £1 billion in grant awards for local charities and community groups.
- £1.18 million distributed through 375 grant awards.
- Established a new £717,000 'Hampshire Community Fund', an amalgamation of 27 trusts and charities transferred from Hampshire County Council, to support children leaving care, music scholarships, talented athletes, school awards and senior residents of a Waterlooville care home.
- Set up a new £40,000 Moneybarn Social Impact Fund to alleviate underlying social issues in the Havant, Gosport and Fareham areas.
- Ran our first 'Youth Mental Health' fund, awarding grants of £55,058 to ten groups helping young people deal with mental health issues.



- Launched the Youth Social Action Fund in partnership with UK Community Foundations (UKCF), administered on behalf of the Big Lottery Fund and the Department of Culture, Media & Sport. The fund awarded grants of £66,683 to enable young people to make a positive difference in their communities.
- Established the Newport Social Needs Fund of £59,000 to support the advancement of health, saving life and the prevention or relief of poverty for the district of Newport.
- Supported Thames Row 2017, which raised over £4,000 for the veterans' mental health charity Combat Stress

and Lymington Rowing Club. Rowers Dave Mans and Rob Maltby became World Record holders for the fastest row along the 167 mile length of the River Thames during the challenge.

Partnering Corporates

HIWCF manages 138 separate funds on behalf of individuals, families, local companies, government, agencies and charitable trusts. Through the Foundation's knowledge of the voluntary sector and our experience of grant making and community development across the area, we are uniquely placed to connect those wanting to support local need in their communities with those carrying out vital services and projects on the front line.

Vivid Fund

Vivid is Hampshire's largest provider of affordable homes and HIWCF administers grants on behalf of the organisation, to help improve the lives of its residents.

Unity in Andover were awarded £6,835 to provide employment stepping stones through volunteering, budgeting and tenancy support.

Participants received intensive support to increase their skills and gained access to learning and employment opportunities. Clients were also offered signposting to other services and agencies, to help improve their circumstances.

Comic Relief

During 2017 HIWCF administered two grant programmes for Comic Relief, firstly the 'Community Cash' Programme awarding grants totalling £46,174. This helped 47 smaller charitable and voluntary groups to purchase vital equipment and run activities to bring the community together.

Secondly, the Comic Relief 'Core Strength – Local Communities Programme' supported six local community groups and charitable organisations working in deprived or disadvantaged areas with their day-to-day running costs through grants totalling £34,712.

Communicare In Southampton

Communicare In Southampton received a grant of £7,500 to continue their service to help relieve poverty, hardship and distress amongst local Southampton people.

Communicare provide visiting and befriending services to the elderly and those with mental health issues helping out those who are lonely and isolated in a friendly neighbourly way.

Larry is Donald's befriender and recently discovered that Donald can sing, so Larry now takes along his guitar when they meet, so that they can 'jam' together each week. Solent Community Grants Programme

The £1 million Solent Community Grants Programme is a two year project part-funded by the European Social Fund. Grants are targeted towards those individuals facing complex barriers to employment, such as physical disability, mental health issues or a history of offending, enabling them to move closer to or into employment.

The programme was created by the Solent Local Enterprise Partnership and also supported by HIWCF donors, Hampshire County Council, Portsmouth City Council and Southampton City Council. It is due for completion in the Summer of 2018.

The Society of St James

The Society of St James is a Southampton based homelessness charity, providing accommodation and support to over 2,500 people

each year. The Society received a grant of £29,997 to provide unemployed and economically inactive adults with the opportunity to participate in training, education and practical work experience. The programme enabled skill development, increased confidence and raised aspirations; resulting in job searching, secured employment or a move into education or training.

One participant, Jason, had received a three year sentence at HMP Winchester for multiple thefts and supplying controlled drugs. Upon release he was referred to The Society of St James' psychosocial group while being tested for drugs twice a week and in receipt of a Suboxone prescription.

Jason, pictured centre, expressed an interest in getting back into employment and coming off benefits, and was referred to the Society's employment project with a commitment to trying the two week work experience placement at the Premier Inn Hotel. Jason opted to work in night security, shadowing another member of staff in his first week, and was then given more responsibility in the second week of his placement. After the two weeks Jason was incredibly proud of himself for having completed this experience, along with feeling confident in his ability to work well within a team in a busy environment. He was informed a week later that he had been successful in his placement and that the hotel would be lucky to have him working with them. Jason was overjoyed with this, and has since been working full time with Premier Inn.

European Union European Social Fund



In 2017 the programme has helped support over 750 residents move closer or into employment through the great work of 32 projects run by 24 organisations.

485 participants were economically inactive and a further 272 unemployed. There was a 56:44 ratio between male and female participants with 161 over 50 years old.

The programme has supported 361 participants with disabilities and 129 offenders or ex-offenders.

Certain organisations were awarded grants where the primary focus was supporting individuals from ethnic minorities, helping 95 participants in the year.

By the time the Solent Community Grant Programme finishes, it is forecast to have helped over 1000 people into or closer to employment.

Vectis Housing Association received a grant of £24,274 to engage with local people on the Isle of Wight who had been out of the labour market for some time, in particular but not exclusively women who had been a victim of domestic abuse, women returning to work and single parents.

The organisation ran intensive courses specifically designed to tackle the psychology of social disadvantage and aimed to build independence, self-esteem, self-motivation and purposefulness. In addition, 'Working Class' courses were held to help with job seekina skills.

Participants engaged with the local college to explore learning opportunities, attending a Food Hygiene course and completing upholstery, decorating, plastering and Spanish courses.

One participant from the 'Mind Your Own Business Course', a single mum with young children, has been inspired to look at a number of seed business ideas and Vectis are continuing to provide support by enabling her to make contact with those in the development sector.

Supporting Portsmouth Communities

In 2017 HIWCF distributed 130 grants to Portsmouth based organisations, worth £319,156, to support local community projects across the City. The case studies below focus on the impact of the Portsmouth City Community Fund, one of our many funds supporting disadvantaged people in this area. According to national deprivation data, Portsmouth contains 16 areas in the 10% most deprived areas in England.

Footprints Project

Footprints aims to reduce the risk of reoffending by helping ex-offenders re-integrate into the community. The group offer a 'through the gate' service, meeting with those in custody prior to and on release from prison. Mentors provide clients with the assistance needed to live a meaningful life without further resorting to crime.

Footprints received £3,716 to support clients such as Alex, who has spent most of his life in and out of prison for burglaries, shoplifting and drug related offences. With a history of substance misuse which began at a young age, by his mid-twenties Alex was using heroin daily. He was disowned by his family due to his chaotic lifestyle but whilst in custody he detoxed and was released on a methadone script. Alex's mentor collected him from prison upon release and supported him to make a claim for benefits, register with a doctor and engage in drug and alcohol services. Unfortunately, Alex met up with old friends and started using heroin again resulting in him losing his accommodation and benefits, and almost being recalled to custody following failure to meet with his probation officer.

After several months, Alex got back in contact

with his Footprints mentor, enabling him to make a new claim for benefits and re-engage with drug services. Whilst detoxing, Alex regained contact with his family, he is now clean and has returned to live with family, spending last Christmas with them for the first time in years. Alex is now enjoying life, and is hoping to secure employment in the near future.

John Pounds Community Trust

The John Pounds Community Trust received a grant of £4,980 for the Holiday Hunger project, which provided children aged between 6 and 11 years old with a free, hot and healthy lunch. These school holiday clubs were held across six adventure playgrounds, each located in deprived areas of the City.

The lunch provided was typically beans on toast or jacket potatoes with extra toppings, salad and fresh fruit, and helped alleviate pressure on low-income families in providing an extra nutritious meal, whilst keeping the children refuelled and ready for their afternoon play activities.

Brendoncare Clubs

Brendoncare Clubs combat loneliness and social isolation amongst older people. Those using the service benefit from better physical and mental health and improved wellbeing and happiness, through all the benefits that enjoying an active social life brings.



Brendoncare Clubs received a grant of £3,000 to contribute towards the running costs of the Drayton Penhryn Social Club, Hillside & Wymering Kurling Club and the Good Companions Club in Milton. Funds were used to cover group activities, equipment, volunteer expenses, refreshments and venue hire.

Island Funds for Island Causes

Isle of Wight charities and voluntary groups received £160,595 of grant funding in 2017, supporting 32 local projects. These funds have been targeted towards the most disadvantaged and vulnerable people on the Island and to date, 621 grants totalling £1,283,148 have been distributed to help those in need in the area.

Rainbow Club

Rainbow Club received a grant of £2,080 to hold a monthly dance class run by a qualified dance coach experienced in working with children with disabilities.

The children can find it very hard to keep up with mainstream dance sessions which tend to run at quite a fast pace, so all instructions are very clear, utilising signs and visuals to support the children throughout the session. The grant covered the purchase of equipment such as ribbons and scarves to enable the children to really get involved in the experience.

Sessions are adapted to be inclusive to all children regardless of their abilities. The children gain so much from the sessions such as confidence, fitness, improved physical strength and development, all at a pace they can manage, and most importantly they have fun together.



Jigsaw Family Support

Jigsaw offers help to Island families in crisis. Supporting the mental health of children and young people coping with bereavement or the impact of their parents splitting up is



a key part of the service provided. The group received a grant of £5,252 to enable them to support young people suffering with mental health issues. The aim is to address the physical and emotional turmoil that may lead to anxiety, substance misuse or anti-social behaviour to transform how young people deal with issues in their future lives in a more positive way.

Island Funds for Island Causes

Cowes Sailability

Cowes Sailability received £1,600 for the running costs of its patrol boat Zebedee, essential to the safe running of the charity's other boats.

The group brings the experience of sailing and boating to all disabled people both young and old, providing adapted boats to meet the needs of people with a wide range of challenges from physical disabilities to learning difficulties.

Sailing gives those who have lost mobility and sometimes their independence an exciting hobby to share with new friends and a new purpose in life, encouraging gentle exercise and social interaction.

"As someone who is restricted to a wheelchair and often in a lot of pain, I used to feel very isolated. Becoming a member of Cowes Sailability Club has given me a real boost. It makes me feel part of something special, keeps depression at bay and makes me feel like I'm living, not just existing", Member, Cowes Sailability

Bus for Homeless Shelter Project

The Bus for Homeless Shelter Project provided safe sleeping arrangements for rough sleepers, both young and old, in the form of a converted double-decker bus. A grant of £3,000 was provided to enable the opening of a charity shop, where users of the bus could volunteer, enabling them to commit to a new and positive venture, providing valuable work experience and a step towards gainful employment.

The charity shop raised over £5,400 for The Bus Shelter, while providing homeless people with new clothes when they needed them. One lady who lived on the bus ran the shop on a part-time basis, before she moved away to be nearer to her family. The experience of running the shop has enabled her to apply for jobs in the retail sector.



Youth Mental Health Fund

Mental health is in the media spotlight at the moment, attracting growing concern that the best intervention and support is given early on to those in our local communities whose lives have been touched by this issue. The new HIWCF Youth Mental Health Fund, which opened for the first time in 2017, enabled fund holders to pool their resources and commit £55,058 to ten local groups, to prevent and treat mental health issues for young people, with support from the Police & Crime Commissioner for Hampshire.

Solent Youth Action

Solent Youth Action received £5.307 to deliver emotional health and wellbeing training to young people in Eastleigh. to help them face their

own fears and frustrations, recognise symptoms and behaviours in themselves, their peers and to know where to go for help and support.

From these sessions, 15 young people were then selected to attend further training days to confidently deliver workshops to their wider circle of peers. The training included team building games, reflections on the emotional well-being training received and discussions around using their new knowledge. Participants were encouraged to bring in their own ideas to raise awareness of mental health issues.



Meeting Need in the Area



In 2017 HIWCF processed 707 application submissions, requesting just over £3 million, with 583 applications totalling just over £2 million invited to the full submission process.

With £1.18m of grants to distribute last year, HIWCF is working extremely hard to raise new funds to meet the vast and growing need in local communities.

Of the 25 most deprived wards in Hampshire, Isle of Wight, Portsmouth and Southampton according to the Index of Multiple Deprivation 2015 data, HIWCF has funded the 16 localities below:



Community & Family Support

- Approximately 5,426 people benefitted, mostly adults aged 26-65
- 14% of beneficiaries were based in Battins in Portsmouth
- 12% of grant funding went to Eastleigh South
- 38% of funding went towards promoting the reduction of isolation and disadvantage and access to local services

Education & Training

- 59 grants totalling £164,717
- Approximately 6,112 people
- 25% of funding went to Charles Dickens in Portsmouth
- Approximately 7,400 volunteer
- 99% of grant funding went towards employability and enterprise



Employment & Skills

- 46 grants totalling £275,957
- Approximately 4,207 people benefitted, mostly adults aged 26-65
- 14% of funding went to Newport North on the Isle of Wight
- 67% of grant funding benefitted the long-term unemployed
- 98% of grant funding went towards improving life skills, education, employability and enterprise

Mental/Physical Health & Disability

- 76 grants totalling £207,276
- Approximately 5,689 people benefitted, mostly young people aged between 13-18
- 25% of funding went to Cosham in Portsmouth
- 49% of funding went towards advancing people's physical and mental health, wellbeing and safety

Poverty & Disadvantage

- 100 grants totalling £175,219
- Approximately 11,648 people benefitted, mostly adults aged between 26-65
- 26% of funding went to Charles Dickens in Portsmouth
- 87% of funding went towards promoting the reduction of isolation and disadvantage and access to local services


Social Inclusion & Equality

- 35 grants totalling £60,615
- Approximately 7,434 people benefitted, 81% of which were seniors aged over 65
- 20% of funding went to Milton in Portsmouth
- 53% of funding went towards promoting the reduction of isolation and disadvantage and access to local services


Primary Beneficiaries and Impact Categories
