

State of the Sector survey 2016

Share your views and experiences as part of Rochdale's Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise Sector (VCSE)

CVS Rochdale is working in partnership with The Centre for Regional Economic and Social Research (CRESR), at Sheffield Hallam University and other partners in our neighbouring boroughs to assess the *State of the Sector* across Rochdale and Greater Manchester. This is a follow-up to the success of the survey completed in 2013.

The 2013 survey **State of the GM VCSE 2013 (**can be accessed via www.gmcvo.org.uk/greatermanchester-state-voluntary-sector-2013) came up with some astonishing headlines - almost 15,000 organisations, contributing £1.7b pa to the economy and enabling 1.1m volunteering hours per week. The information has helped us raise the profile of VCSE organisations, and make the case for their importance. It is really important that we have up to date information from as many organisations as possible to help us to advocate for you in the context of Rochdale, Greater Manchester and Devolution.

It takes just 20 minutes to help us, and every single response matters. The questions aren't compulsory so you should be able to skip on if you can't answer a particular one. The survey closes on 27^{th} **November**, please don't leave it until the last minute. The prize draw for the £250 will be drawn Monday 9th January and the winner will be notified thereafter.

Once you've completed the survey, please also encourage as many organisations as possible to do the same; forward this email, share the link on social media, make a plea at any events you host, and talk about it whenever possible.

Sector Leadership & Representation

The CEO's main focus during the month of October has been around Health & Wellbeing, particularly the changes that are coming into place as a result of Greater Manchester Devolution.

Development of a fully integrated Locality Care Organisation (LCO)

On 12th October, CVS Rochdale on behalf of the sector were invited to a meeting to begin the establishment of a "Fully Integrated Local Care Organisation" (LCO). LCO's are going to be multiple health & social care provider organisations working together to deliver health and social care services within a defined budget. They will have to manage and co-ordinate the care of individuals along the full length of clinical and social care pathways, treating and supporting patients in different and more appropriate settings as a result of improved co-ordination. They will also be required to demonstrate a standardised approach to quality improvement activity and increased involvement and engagement of local residents in design, delivery and improvement of services.

It is proposed within the borough that the focus of the LCO will be the over 60's due to the ageing population and the increasing costs of health & social care services to this section of the population. The other reason for selecting this section of the population is that there are existing joint programmes that provide a sound base from which to work, such as the Intermediate Care, Oasis Unit and Integrated Neighbourhood Teams. These existing partnerships show that the potential members of the LCO can work together to deliver better outcomes for residents.

The development of the LCO has implications for the sector, particularly with regards to funding and contracts as eventually all budgets for health & social care will go through the LCO, who will decide how the money is spent and who the providers will be. The good news for the sector is that the Voluntary Sector Health & Wellbeing Alliance has been formally recognised as the mechanism through with the LCO will engage with and sub contract the sector.

Integrated Neighbourhood Teams – 13th October 2016

Our CEO was invited to attend a meeting with Pennine Acute Hospitals NHS Trust and their delivery partners Link4Life, Carer's Trust Greater Manchester and Veterans in Communities. The Integrated Neighbourhood Team programme is a 5 year contract which will develop integrated neighbourhood teams based around GP clusters. At present these do not exist and the last 6 months of service delivery has been very much around the transfer of staff from the 10 health teams into the programme.

The focus of the meeting on 13th October was about how the service can have a better and more productive relationships with the sector. It was agreed that an event would be held with the sector to engage them in shaping the integrated neighbourhood teams development.



Health & Wellbeing Alliance Thematic Partnerships

Community Base Network

The main focus of the Community Base Network has been on the development of a strategy for the network. This has involved a half day workshop to look at all of the strategies within the borough to establish where local community Centres who are members of this network already provide services that contribute to the outcomes. This has now been developed into a strategy for the network going forward. The exciting piece of work within the strategy is around the development of a monitoring system that has an outcomes and social return on investment focus. This will be designed by the funders and members of the network.

They have also been working with the people who use their centres to raise awareness of Rochdale Council's proposals to reduce the overall funding to community centres by £75K from April 17 onwards

Leadership Group

The Health & Wellbeing Alliance Leadership Group is in a period of transition with regards to it's membership and is moving towards its' membership becoming more strategic and joining up the 10 thematic partnerships that make up the Alliance. The membership during the next month will be tightened up to only include the lead organisation's from the 10 thematic partnerships and other relevant stakeholders such as HealthWatch Rochdale, Link4Life, CVS Rochdale, Big Life, Rochdale Boroughwide Housing, Pennine West Citizen's Advice Bureau and Groundwork in Bolton, Bury, Oldham & Rochdale.

The purpose of the Leadership group is to lead on behalf of the whole Health & Wellbeing Alliance. They have during the past few months been working in partnership with NHS Heywood, Middleton & Rochdale clinical Commissioning Group and Rochdale Council around engagement of the sector in the Locality Plan The hard work of this group has been recognised as it has been confirmed that the Health & Wellbeing Alliance (through it's thematic partnerships and leadership group) will be the main vehicle through which the proposed local care organisation will sub contract with the sector going forward.

There is going to be a lot of exciting work for this group during the next few months as they work with our public body partners to formulate the transformation fund bid which will include funds to integrate the Health & Wellbeing Alliance into the LCO, reforming commissioning, developing service standards across the membership for the alliance and integrating the sector into place based neighbourhood service delivery.

All the information on each of the 10 Thematic Partnerships is now on our updated website, under Development & Engagement, Health & Wellbeing Alliance, this includes agendas, minutes from each meeting held and a calendrer of proposed dates. The pages will be updated after each meeting.

Financial Management Services

When is your organisations financial year end?

If the yearend is the 31st March 2016 then time is rapidly running out to have your accounts prepared, independently examined or audited as the case may be and then filed with the authorities.

If your organisation is a company limited by guarantee or a community interest company (CIC) you need to have your accounts filed with Companies House by the 31st December 2016.

If it is a Registered Charity you also need to file the accounts before the end of January 2017.

Companies House have always been able to issue financial penalties for late filing (starting at \pounds 150.00 and rising \pounds 1,500.00). This penalty is doubled if they are filed late for two consecutive periods. On top of this filing penalty the Directors of the company can also individually and jointly be fined or sent to prison as failing to file accounts and other required reports with Companies House on time is a criminal offence.

Although the Charity Commission are a bit more lenient they are now regularly investigating charities that don't file on time for two years running and again the Trustees face the risk of punishment by the courts.

If you need help in getting your yearend accounts sorted, and filed then I may be able to help. I can prepare and independently examine accounts, if you legally need to have an audit, you would need to see an auditor.

CVS Rochdale's charges are very reasonable at only £20.00 per hour. If you want to discuss year end accounts further please contact Stuart Golding.

ORGANISATION/GROUP SUPPORT

Over the past couple of months I have supported people to set up a completely new group in Heywood and two other groups in Rochdale to register as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIC). Once again funding has been at the forefront of my work, with 8 groups requiring advice or support on completing funding applications. The type of support provided included funding searches to identify potential funders to support with bid writing and guidance on how to complete funding applications.

NEW FUNDING SEARCH FACILITIES

The CVSR funding portal and access to Grantfinder is no longer available. CVSR will be providing a similar service free via Funding Central available from 7TH NOVEMBER 2017.

Funding Central provides similar functions to assist with fundraising. Each funding search produces a tailored list of results for you to explore. Funding listings are easy to read and will be updated regularly, highlighting key criteria, guidance documents, how to apply and contact details amongst other headings.





Never Too Old To Do IT

NEVER TOO OLD TO DO IT!





We offer a structured, 8 week programme designed especially to provide older learners with a relaxed, friendly and supportive environment in which to learn. Our aim is to give our learners the confidence and the ability to use modern technology to enhance their everyday life. The tablet course allows learners to explore the language of tablets and apply this knowledge when using their own device be that a tablet or smartphone.

Courses have taken place across Rochdale, Middleton and

Heywood at various venues to ensure that we reach as many people as possible. The next round of courses will include 2 venues in the Milnrow area increasing the reach of our courses. We have once again increased the number of courses from 7 to 8 in order to better accommodate the needs of our learners and allow us to offer either morning or afternoon sessions.

As previously reported we are now concentrating on delivering tablet courses as feedback and enquiries from our learners have indicated that this is what they want, however we now have a

number of learners on our waiting list who want a dedicated laptop course and we are looking to offer one once we have sufficient numbers to make it viable.

As reported last time, many of our learners are now requesting a "next step" course to help them to better engage with more advanced topics or engage with specific areas of interest such as social media. Taking these comments on board we have delivered a number of smart gadget and one to one sessions and we are monitoring their effectiveness.

A major change in delivery for the next round of courses has been a focus on supporting learners in assisted living schemes. We are due to start courses in three such schemes, two of which are in Milnrow and one in Heywood. The courses are open to residents and the general public and initial feedback has been very positive with both residents and learners from the surrounding areas joining the courses. We are hopeful that this will be successful and we anticipate that it can be rolled out to other assisted living schemes in the borough.

Never Too Old To Do IT

Since my last update I have been extremely busy delivering courses in the Rochdale borough. On Mondays I teach beginners I.T. to carers who access the Carers Resource in Rochdale, all day Wednesday I teach the basics of how to use tablet computers to people aged 50 and over for Pride Media Association and Thursdays I deliver a "caring with confidence" course to carers within the Rochdale Borough. I have also been providing support for people aged 50 and over at drop in sessions in Rochdale and Heywood, I am currently running a drop in session at Crimble Croft Community centre for people who need support in using their computers and or mobile Telephones.

In my beginners IT class we have been creating new e-mail accounts, looking at how to stay in touch with friends and family through programmes such as e-mail, Skype and Messenger, which for most of us are important parts of our daily lives but for carers, who may be unable get out and about as much due to their caring role, these programmes are a crucial part of combatting social isolation. The 8 week Tablet classes I have been delivering have been really successful and empowering, not only for the learners but for me personally. Each new learner brings something new and refreshing but also challenging and thought provoking especially with some of the questions they ask. On the very first day of class one Gentleman asked me "if I knew how to Media flick between his Tablet and his Television"? I am aware how this works but I wasn't expecting that calibre of question in a Beginners class.

The drop in sessions I am covering are a fantastic way for people who don't have time to attend a designated class, to call in with an issue they cannot resolve and get it sorted. Most drop in problems are quick to sort although one lady called in to see me at a drop in as she couldn't activate her Antivirus, this took me a good hour to rectify, but it was essential as Computer Safety is paramount in todays society with all the viruses, spam and malware that is around.

Having worked all my life I was devastated when I was made redundant at the age of 51 after 16 years with the company. A few years later having suffered epilepsy for over 40 years the consultant suggested I had brain surgery to remove a scar. After long decisions and many tests I decided to go ahead with it, so had to finish at the part time office job I was enjoying.

The surgery went well but caused various problems with my memory, balance speech etc. The local rehab team worked hard with me to improve these.

I was bored at home every day as I had always worked so needed to get out and back into something. Rehab suggested volunteering, maybe in office work as this would be a test to see if I could learn something new.

I went to the volunteer centre with a member of rehab for support to see what was available, I met a lady I worked with in the past. She worked in the office for the Volunteer Drivers and asked me to join them.

I thoroughly enjoy working for the Volunteer Driver Service. Arranging transport for customers going to appointments or maybe just shopping, and speaking to all our friendly drivers. I usually work two days a week, but the office staff work great as a team so I have no problem if I need time off for appointments.

Working for the Volunteer Driver Service has got me back into a regular routine, helped to build my confidence and improve my speech and memory.



Community Development & Engagement

Kirkholt Million Partnership

Hello, my name is Chris Henderson the new Community Engagement Worker with the Kirkholt Million [KM] Project.

Prior to this role, I worked in various Housing related roles for over 30 years, mainly in Rochdale but also in Glasgow. This included being the Housing Manager of the Freehold Housing Estate in Rochdale were I was responsible for rent collection, resolving complaints and dealing with any anti social behaviour on the estate. Along with this, I worked very closely with the Freehold Tenants and Residents Group and together we applied for funding to put on various events for Residents throughout the year. This included an Annual International Women's Day, a Christmas Party and an Eid event. We also organised Summer Play schemes for the children on the estate and days trips out to places such as Drayton Manor Park, Alton Towers, Blackpool and Gulliver's World.

Part of my new role as Community Engagement Workers is to support the development of existing Community Groups as well as work with local residents to develop NEW Community Groups in the KM area. There is a packed agenda including a presentation on the journey so far, a tour of the estate including a stop off at the skate park and a workshop with action learning of how to involve young people.







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
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
