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

Other indoor experiments included observing slime eat magnets; a confused grape that floated under oil but on top of corn syrup; as well as corn starch mixture interchanging between liquid and solid dual state when pressure was applied. The students had to explain their experiments to all visitors (parents, teachers and students) and what a great job they did!


The students were able to understand the plot and key themes in the play and had the opportunity to ask the actors and director questions at the end.



BEHIND THE SCENES AT HIS

Since the setting up of HELP International School in January 2014, the school has had the privilege to be served by a team of dedicated administrative staff who work behind the scenes quietly. In our second feature, we cover the school's nurses, librarians, exam officer and science laboratory technicians.

Ms Aziela Arif & Ms Christine Heng

School Nurses

Ms Aziela and Ms Christine have a combined experience of 13 years working in various hospitals, clinics and international schools including Mont Kiara International School. They both have to juggle their roles as mothers at home and nurses at the school. When they are not at work, they like spending time with their families. Ms Aziela enjoys drawing and cooking with her children (her laksa is a must try!) and Ms Christine loves reading with her three-year-old.

What is a typical day like for you?

Aziela: One must always be ready to expect the unexpected. A typical day in HIS is always busy. We used to start our day only at 8 am, but we have started coming in at 7:30 am instead.

Christine: Though the school gates only open at 7:30 am, there are days when students are already waiting at the clinic at 7:30 am.

Aziela: We have an average of about 50 students at the school clinic every day, except Fridays, for medical assistance on various types of illnesses and injuries. Occasionally we attend to more serious cases like an allergic reaction, seizure, etc. We have to be vigilant at all times and ensure our medical supply is well stocked.

What do you like most about your job?

Aziela: I like being able to help children. I feel good when cranky children finally leave the clinic feeling happy. Some come to us probably only because they need someone to talk to. These children need "Tender,

Loving and Care" (TLC) rather than medical attention. So, I usually try to find out more and get to know them better before I treat them accordingly. I also enjoy being able to educate them informally about health and nutrition by chatting with them.

Christine: I love it when the children come in to tell me stories! It is so amusing to have them trying their best to relate how their friend has fallen down. Everyone else is so eager to tell the story, except the one who is actually injured!

What is the most challenging part of your job?

Aziela: I used to work in the specialised paediatrics unit in the hospital before and over there, I would examine the patient before the doctor would come. The doctor would actually ask me for consultation on the dosage of medication before prescription. In total, I have at least 8 years of practical medical experience plus many



years of education in nursing.

Over here in school, I have had the experience of meeting parents. Some parents would come to tell me what I should do because of their research on Google. I understand it is natural for parents to be anxious over their children's wellbeing. It is not easy to convince these parents to place their trust in the school nurses, rather than Google research. But we have learned to build trust slowly with these parents after they got to know us better. We always keep proper documentation for each medical case that we tend to so that we can explain actions taken.

What characteristics must one possess in order to be a good nurse?

Aziela: It is important to be knowledgeable, competent, skillful and patient. You must also be firm at times because some will try to push the boundaries with you. Some children simply come to the clinic because they want to skip classes. You need to be patient to find out what is the underlying reason for doing that and try to help them.

Christine: Passion in the job is most important. I feel that a passionate nurse is different from one who is merely skillful.

Ms Elizabeth Annaranjitham & Ms Chow Hui Ping School Librarians

A former school principal for 11 years and a veteran educator for over 30 years, Ms Elizabeth joined HIS when the school first started in 2014. As one of the pioneer librarians, she has seen how much the resources have grown in the library. During her free time, Ms Elizabeth, a doting grandma, loves reading and playing with her three lovely grandchildren.

Prior to joining HIS, Ms Hui Ping spent 19 years working in New Zealand and Malaysia. A mother of a beautiful

little girl, Ms Hui Ping loves reading and swimming. One of her favourite books that she used to read to her daughter every night before bed is *No Bed Without Ted* by Nicola Smee.

What is your daily routine like?

Elizabeth: My first 'customers' are usually here at the library by the time I get in, eager to return their books. The library gets very busy from 8:30 am onwards as there could be as many as 3 classes at any one time. When the students come in by classes, I will be tied up at the loan counter and after the classes leave, my time will be spent on cataloguing, shelving and sorting out the Teachers' Resources as well as Guided Reading materials.

Hui Ping: I start the day by checking library books in and out at the circulation desk, followed by back-end work like processing, cataloguing and shelving. There are also days when we have to do planning for parent volunteers' duty roster, literacy projects, World Book Week where we invite writers and illustrators, as well as liaising with book suppliers and publishers for selection of recommended books.

How is working in HIS different from working in your previous workplace?

Elizabeth: Life as a principal was a lot more hectic. I left my former school about 4 years ago and started teaching as a part-time English lecturer at the University of Malaya as well as being a part-time school librarian at HIS. Initially, I wanted to stay in this librarian job only temporarily as I was waiting for term to start at the university. However, I ended up choosing this job over lecturing and stay much longer than I had intended! I guess I like the school environment and the students more!

Hui Ping: I was an image librarian. As an image librarian, I catalogued the images into various categories and then uploaded them as company

photos. I was also in the publishing industry where I did a lot of administration and coordination work. In those jobs, I dealt with just adults. At HIS, I get to meet children on a daily basis, and that is a refreshing change!

What is the best thing in the HIS library?

Elizabeth: The parent volunteers! I wouldn't have been able to do this without their help. They attend to their duties faithfully every week and without asking anything in return. We have a lot of fun and laughter working together in the library.

Hui Ping: The library is a very comfortable place for all. Here, children are able to explore their reading interest without having to feel they are forced or compelled to do so. Reading simply becomes a pleasure in such an environment.

Ms Tan Wui Lim Examination Officer

Ms Tan had 23 years of experience working at several secondary schools in Kuala Lumpur before joining HIS. She has a son who is studying at university. At the end of a long school day, Ms Tan looks forward to going home to her family, have a warm bath, and relax on her couch with her favourite Korean TV shows.

What is your daily routine like?

I start off the day with clearing my school emails, responding to exam queries from teachers, and keeping track of key dates and activities for exams by Cambridge International Examination Board as well as our own school exams calendar. I am particularly busy before, during and after examination period, helping students register for external exams, ensuring all examination papers are secured, arranging for invigilation and the setting up of exam halls according to specification by Cambridge, as well as the delivery of the exam papers for marking and assessment.

What is the most satisfying part of your job?

I take my responsibility as an exam officer seriously, ensuring each examination process runs smoothly, and the examination venue is conducive enough for our students to concentrate during their exams.

What would you like to say to students before they enter the exam hall?

Take a deep breath, you have done what you could in studying and understanding the syllabus, now just go and do your very best. Exams are not your whole life, but a good attitude towards learning and a thirst for intellectual curiosity will be your lifelong best friend. Also, don't forget to write down your name on the exam paper!

Ms Jega has a Bachelor of Science degree in biochemistry from University of Malaya (UM), and 10 years of experience working as a lab tech and research assistant at the medical research unit in UM and a veterinary hospital. Before joining HIS, she was volunteering in an NGO in East Timor as an English teacher.

Ms Jaya, also known as Aunty to HIS students, has more than 30 years of experience as a lab tech in secondary schools in Klang Valley. Ms Jaya's son just got married and is currently working in the Netherlands. She hopes to visit him and his family one day with her husband.

Ms Afiqah recently joined HIS from Nexus International School. She has a Bachelor of Science degree in biochemistry from the University of Glasgow, UK. Ms Afiqah enjoys working with students and looks forward to getting to know them better.

What is a typical day like for you?

We take care of all lab equipment and apparatus. Before each class, we make up the chemical solutions, assemble

apparatus, run trial experiments in the prep rooms and then deliver equipment to the labs. After classes, we have to clean the bench surfaces, apparatus and fixed equipment, and dispose the chemical waste. Sometimes, we also assist the teachers in class practical including carrying out demonstrations; as well as providing technical advice and support to teachers, especially in health and safety guidance. We also do procurement, organisation of storage of chemicals and equipment.

What do you enjoy the most about your job?

Jega: I guess it would be the interaction with students. When they ask questions, I like to share with them what I know. I like to see them having the thirst for knowledge, discovering the magic of science and experiencing the joy in learning.

Jaya: I enjoy science and I never get tired of preparing chemical solutions and doing lab work after 30 years in the science labs!

Afiqah: I like this job because of how hands on it is and how busy it keeps me all day! We support teachers and students of 25 secondary and A-Level classes, with multiple science periods within a class each week. So yes, we are very busy! And I love it!






