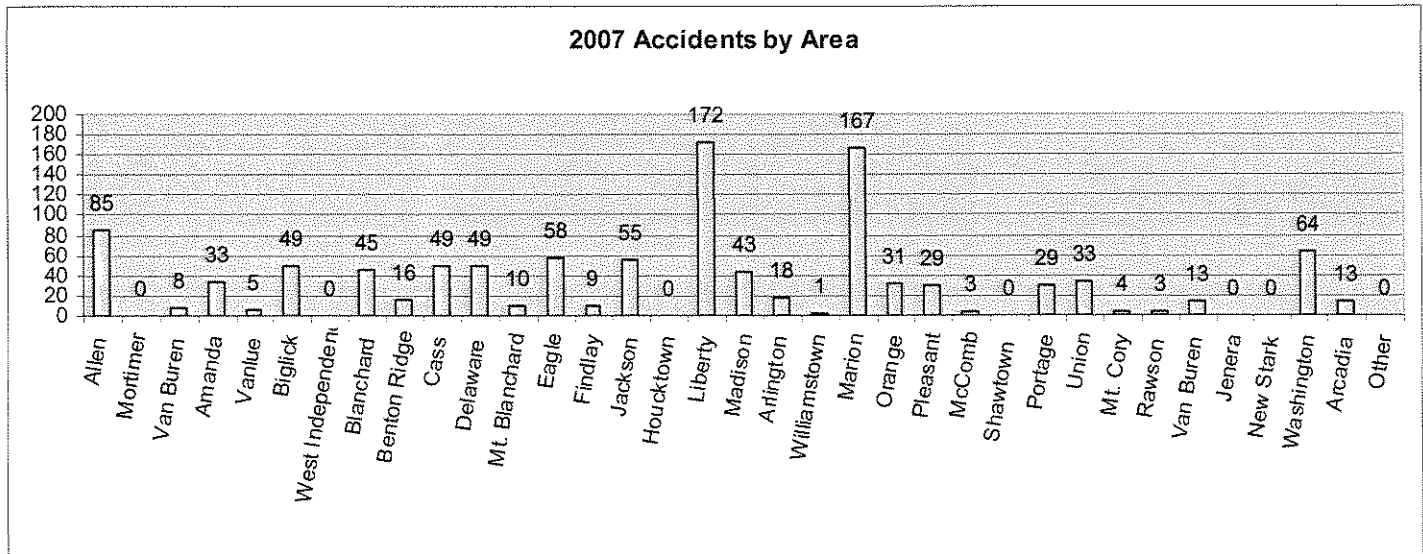
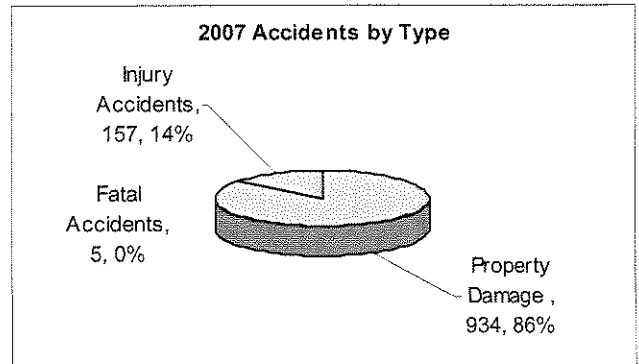
Enforcement –Accidents

The Sheriff's Office responded to 1,094 accident calls. Of these, 934 involved property damage, 157 were injury accidents and there were 5 fatal accidents. Fatal accidents were up from 1 in 2006 and 4 in 2005.

Included in the 934 property damage accidents are those involving deer- deer crashes totaled 364 for 2007.

There were 29 alcohol related crashes. The average BAC (blood alcohol content) test registered 0.177%, with another 44 individuals refusing the BAC test.

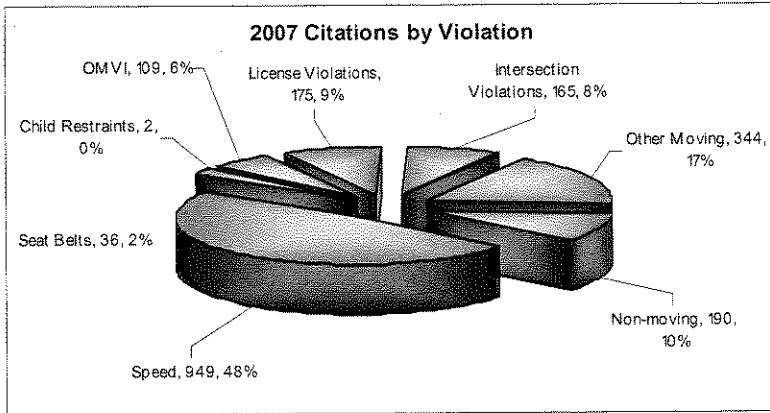
As with Incident reports, the highest number of accidents occur in more highly populated areas. The chart below shows the accidents as they occurred by area. For more detailed statistics, please see Appendix A, Chart 2.



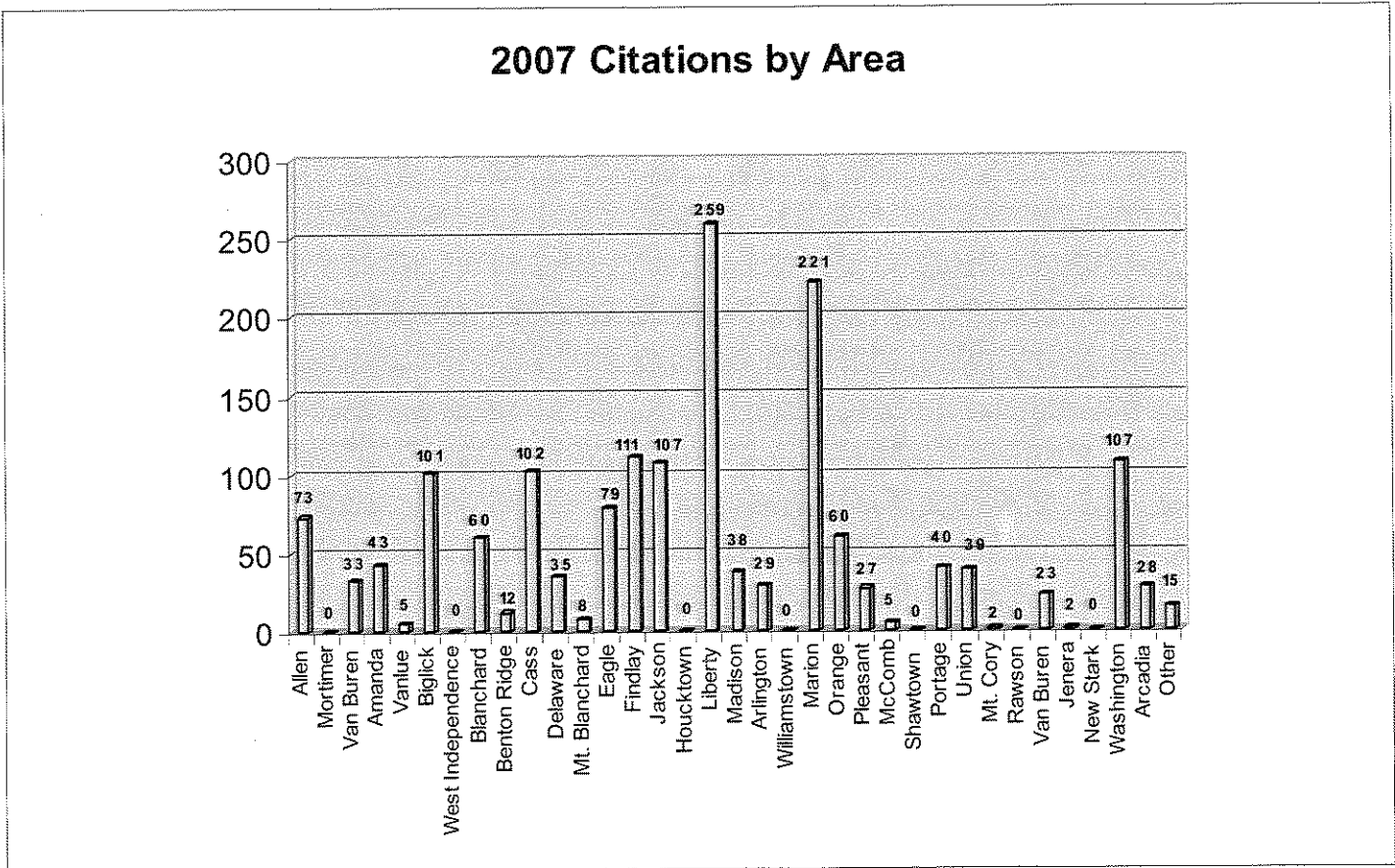
The deputies respond to all types of accident calls, from minor property damage to major fatal accidents. The dispatch center receives a call and calls out the deputy to respond. The dispatcher must also try to determine if there are injuries, and correspondingly call out the proper fire departments to assist, as well as the ambulance service to respond. This is a difficult and demanding job, and the dispatchers and deputies should be commended for being professional, especially as many of these calls are extremely stressful.

Enforcement – Citations

Citations are issued for traffic violations. The total number of citations given in 2007 was 1,664, down from 2,029 in 2006. Several violations can be issued on a single citation. There were 1,970 violations written up in 2007. Below, the diagram shows that 48%, slightly under half, were issued for speed. Operating a motor vehicle while under the influence, or OMVI, accounted for another 6%, license violation was 9%, intersection violations totaled 8%, and other moving violations accounted for 17% of the total. The balance were for child restraint, seat belt and non-moving violations.



Again, as in incidents and accidents, those areas that are more highly populated tend to have higher volume with citations. But there is a little less variance between areas. This is due to the type of roadways (those more highly traveled) in their area. Liberty Township accounted for 16% of citations, 16% of accidents and 23% of incidents. Marion Township incurred 13% of citations, 15% of accidents and 10% of the incidents in the county. For more detailed statistics on citations, see Appendix A, Chart 3.



Enforcement - Communications & K-9

Communications

Another very important area of the Sheriff's Office is Communications. There are 7 full time dispatchers that work 24 hours a day taking calls and aiding the deputies by assigning calls, gathering information, and making calls as needed to assist in accidents and incidents. Dispatchers are responsible for paging out weather alerts, EMS calls, and county firefighters as well as deputies. They are also responsible for controlling all secured doors on the first level of the office. The dispatch center is the center for monitoring cameras around the area county buildings. Dispatchers are considered the lifeline for a deputy while on duty.



One of the accomplishments for 2007 was to install a CAD (Computer Aided Dispatch) in our communications area. This program enhances the dispatchers' ability to track calls for service and view where deputies are via mapping.



Sheriff's Office Website

Another very important aspect of today's communication is the world wide web. The Sheriff's Office has had a website for several years, but in 2006 we brought the design and updating capabilities in-house. After several months of work, we launched a new look in September, 2006 with new software and have been able to track the "hits" to the site since. In 2007, the website received 30,973 hits to the site with 59,426 pages visited. We plan to keep adding features and updating the site on a regular basis. Our website is www.hancocksheriff.org.

K-9 Units

The Hancock County Sheriff's Office has two canine units: Caikli, who works with Deputy Ron Digby, and Becky, who pairs up with Deputy Fred Smith. The units handled 70 incidents in 2007, conducted 3 building searches (related to burglaries at residences, breaking & entering to businesses, etc.), and conducted 39 drug searches. The pair also went out on 5 suspect tracks (tracking suspects that fled from law enforcement, crime scenes, etc). The units also performed 11 K9 demonstrations for schools and civic groups.

The canine units also provide assistance to other agencies. Agencies requesting our assistance in 2007 included the Findlay Police Department (P.D.), Fostoria P.D., McComb P.D., the METRICH Drug Unit, Fostoria ZTTF (Zero Tolerance Task Force), Allen County Sheriff's Office (SO), Hardin County SO, Seneca County SO, Wood County SO, Wyandot County SO, and the Ohio State Highway Patrol.

The canine units and their handlers must undergo training on a regular basis, including obedience, narcotics searches, building searches, handler protections, person tracking, and more. The units spent 223 hours in training in 2007.

Enforcement

Criminal Investigations

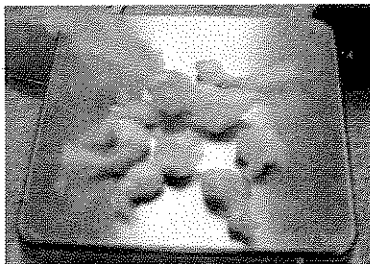
Detective Unit

The Detective Unit of the Hancock County Sheriff's Office has a sergeant, 1 drug investigator and 2 investigators who handle all other cases. Some of the types of cases handled are burglaries, thefts, internet fraud, bad checks, child abuse, and other cases which go beyond the scope of the deputies. The Detective Unit was assigned 103 cases, cleared 74 cases and had 42 arrests in 2007.

Hancock County is part of the METRICH Enforcement Unit, the largest drug task force in the State of Ohio. The Vice Narcotics Unit is part of the Detective Division of the Findlay Police Department. There are four detectives from the Findlay Police Department and one deputy from the Hancock County Sheriff's Office assigned to work narcotics, gambling, weapons, prostitution, and gang investigations in all of Hancock County. Detective Sergeant Thomas Blunk from the Sheriff's Office is the Access Officer for the Hancock METRICH Enforcement Unit and Detective Sergeant James Mathias from the Findlay P.D. is the Unit Supervisor. The METRICH Unit opened 83 new cases, closed 103 cases and dealt with 77 defendants in 2007.

Fostoria Zero Tolerance Task Force

In 2006, Hancock County joined Wood and Seneca Counties in forming the Fostoria Area Zero Tolerance Task Force, funded by grant monies from the Greater Fostoria Community Foundation. Fostoria is located in the corner of the three adjoining counties, and the task force was formed to lower crime in the Fostoria area. There is one deputy assigned from each of the counties. The unit started operations on April 1, 2006. In 2007, the ZTTF handled 101 incident reports, had 106 criminal arrests, including 119 drug offenses, 1 assault/violence, and 66 vehicle related offenses. The task force initiated 726 traffic stops, issued 672 warnings and had 175 traffic arrests.



HIDTA Team

The HIDTA Team (High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area) is a group of 5 road deputies specially trained to patrol for drug trafficking and other suspicious activity on the roads. There is one sergeant assigned to schedule and oversee the operations. The team spends 24 hours per month dedicated to these special patrols. In 2007, the team yielded 10 grams of cocaine/crack cocaine, 246,543 grams of marijuana and had 8 drug paraphernalia cases. These cases resulted in 7 felony arrests and 7 misdemeanor arrests. The team also handled 2 receiving stolen property cases, 1 involving guns and the other involving vehicles.

The year was highlighted with a stop and seizure of 543 pounds of marijuana by Deputy Fred Smith and Deputy Josh Peters while assisting Motor Carrier Enforcement Officer Emmett from the Ohio State Highway Patrol.

Enforcement - School Resource Officers & Support Staff

School Resource Officers

Hancock County has two School Resource Officers (SRO's) who spend their days during the school year in the County Schools. SRO's stop in to make their presence known to students and teachers, help with educational programs, and handle any incidents that may occur in the schools. Deputy Mike McGuire and Deputy Kreg Sheets also are active in several local and state level organizations involved in crime prevention and education, such as the Hancock County TRIAD (a senior citizen group) and the Ohio Crime Prevention Association.



These two officers handled 72 calls for service in the schools in 2007, made 763 school visits and drove a total of 23,081 miles. During the summer months, the SRO's help with vacation relief by working with the road deputies as well as working on special projects involving crime prevention and community policing events. They also work with the schools on their emergency response plans (required to be done in each school, every year, by the state).

Dep. Sheets

Support Staff

The Sheriff's Office employs 8 staff members who handle the business and clerical end of the organization. They share many duties, including answering the window and daily court runs. The Rehabilitation & Opportunity Center has one clerk who handles resident intake and paperwork, cash receipts, inventory and supply ordering.

Corrections has two clerks who handle all inmate recordkeeping and correspondence related to the jail. They also are in charge of commissary ordering and distribution, answering public inquiries about inmates, and many other tasks. These clerks work on the Corrections floor with all other Corrections personnel.

Transport Warrant unit has a Civil Clerk, who handles all paperwork relating to civil paper service, executions on property and Sheriff's Sales (See "Civil Division" on page 13).

The Enforcement Division has a Records Clerk, who handles all record related matters. The Records Clerk scans all paperwork for incidents, accidents and citations not already in the computer, tracks the records in the filing system and answers all public record requests for copies of the reports. She also does local background checks for the public and maintains the Records Retention plan for Enforcement and Administration, and also assists in the website design and updating. In 2007, there were 5,154 records processed, 789 requests for background checks and 2,371 requests for copies of reports.

The Accounts Payable clerk is responsible for ordering supplies for the office, entering purchase orders and paying invoices and billing for the jail. She also maintains the Records Retention plan for Corrections. The Human Resource Specialist is responsible for all payroll, personnel records, uniform issuance, and initial interviewing of new applicants. She also is our grant writer and writes our employee newsletter.

The Administrative Assistant is responsible for compiling monthly financial reports, compiling the annual budget, writing the public newsletter and the Annual Report, as well as correspondence for the Sheriff. She also coordinates the Strategic Planning process and the Citizens Sheriff's Academy classes.

All clerks perform a wide variety of other duties to assist the officers and help make the organization run smoothly. The duties listed are only part of what it takes to keep paperwork flowing and help keep the public informed.

Transport Warrant & Civil Division

Transport / Warrant Unit

The Transport Warrant Unit is responsible for the safe and secure transport of prisoners to and from the jail to other detention facilities, court appearances and medical appointments. The unit transported 1,969 prisoners in 2007 and spent 1,883 hours transporting to other detention facilities, driving 57,218 miles. There were seven extraditions in 2007—transporting of prisoners to Hancock County from other states.

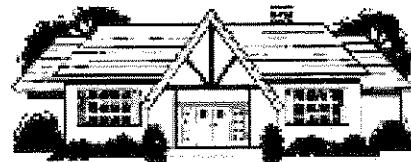
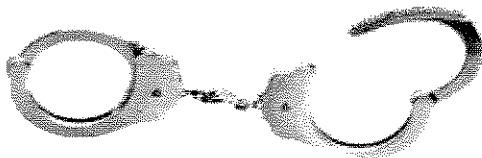
There were 1,216 criminal warrants received in 2007, with 939 warrants being cleared. The court issued 191 civil warrants, and 143 were cleared.

The Transport Warrant Unit is also responsible for security for the courthouse and all court related buildings. The unit spent 2,348 hours manning the Courthouse Entrance, 899 hours in Common Pleas Court, 57 hours checking on the buildings on County Road 140 (BMV/ROC/CSEA), 206 hours for Juvenile Court, 424 hours in Findlay Municipal Court and 34 hours for the in-house courtroom in the Justice Center.

The Sex Offender Registration is also handled by T/W. In 2007, there were 194 Sexually Oriented Offender registrations, 9 Habitual Offender registrations, and 58 Sexual Predator registrations and notifications.

CCW licenses (Concealed Carry Weapon) are applied for and given through this unit. There were 133 permits issued in 2007. All juvenile and civilian fingerprinting is also done by the T/W unit. There were 301 fingerprint requests in 2007, 103 for electronic (Webcheck) and 198 for manual fingerprint rolling.

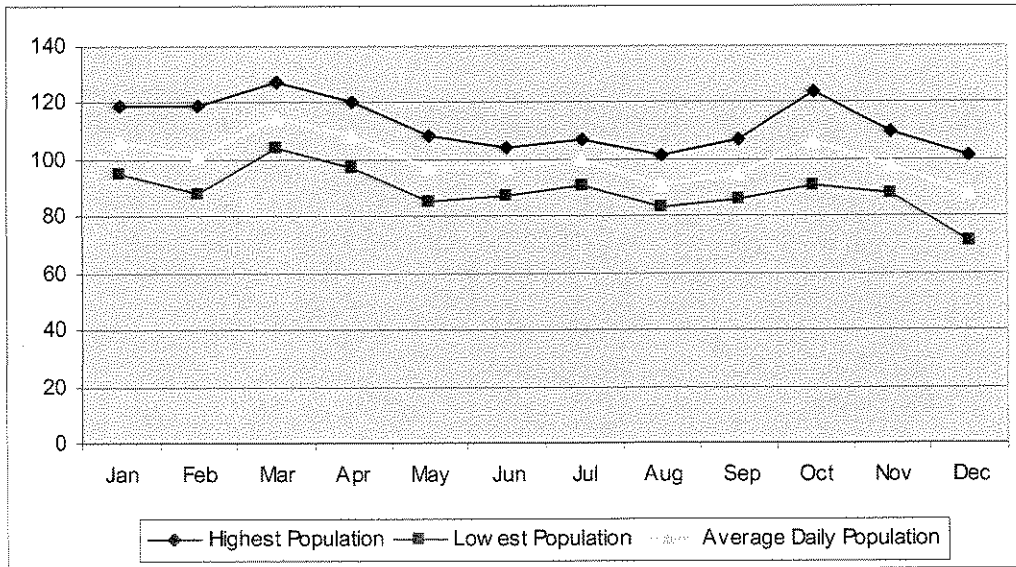
Civil Division

The Civil Division, a part of the Transport Warrant Unit, is responsible for receiving, preparing and returning papers to and from the courts. This includes summons, subpoenas, writs, orders, and other papers needing to be served to the public. The clerk prepares the proper paperwork and passes the papers on to the road units to be served. Once the papers are served, the clerk then prepares the papers to return to court. In 2007, we received 2,930 civil papers and served 2,307.

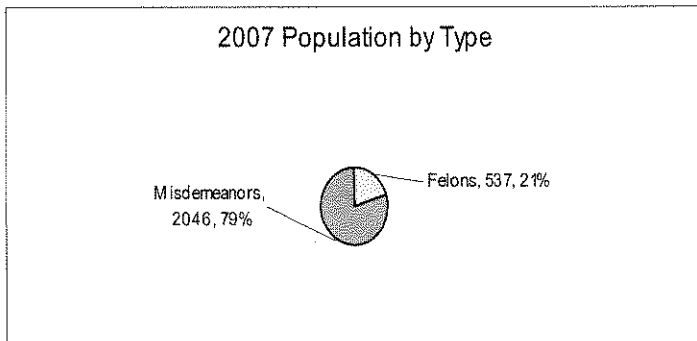
Another large part of the Civil Clerk's duties is to prepare Sheriff's Sales for processing. This includes getting appraisals lined up, advertising in the newspaper, preparing for the sale, and returning the sale papers to the courts. It is estimated that each sale takes approximately 4 1/2 hours of preparation from start to finish. As foreclosures have ballooned over the last few years, the personnel time needed has increased. In 2007 we received 385 sales, conducted 338 appraisals and 260 sales of property. In 2002, five years ago, we received 144 sales, conducted 124 appraisals and 86 sales. This represents a 267% increase in foreclosure activity.

Corrections

The Hancock County Justice Center booked in 2,649 prisoners in 2007 and released 2,673. The following charts show population demographics for the jail for 2007.

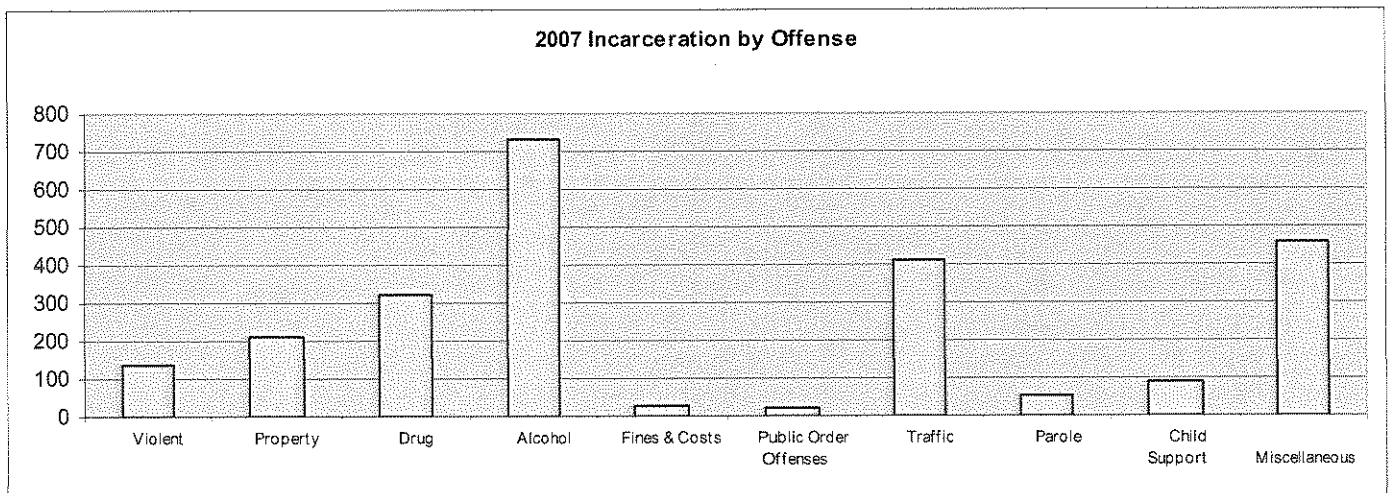


Average daily population for 2007 was 100, the same as 2006. As you can see from the chart above, population spiked in March and again in October. We housed prisoners in Putnam County through September, but only utilized part of our allotted bed space. We were able to keep total Outside Housing expense in 2007 down to \$31,365.

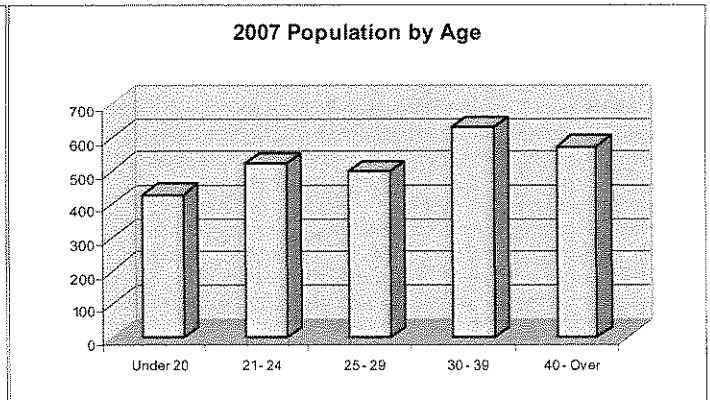
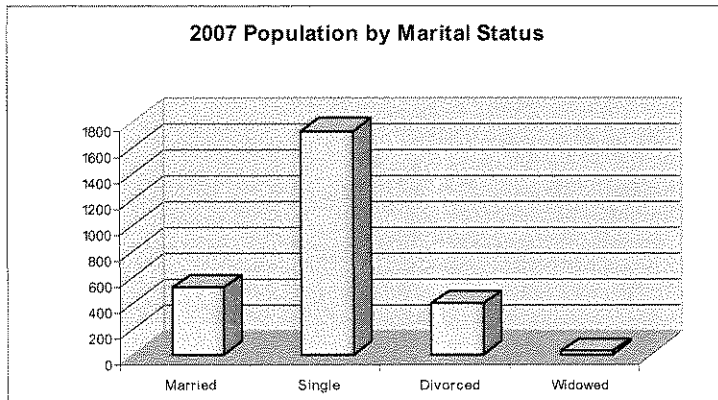
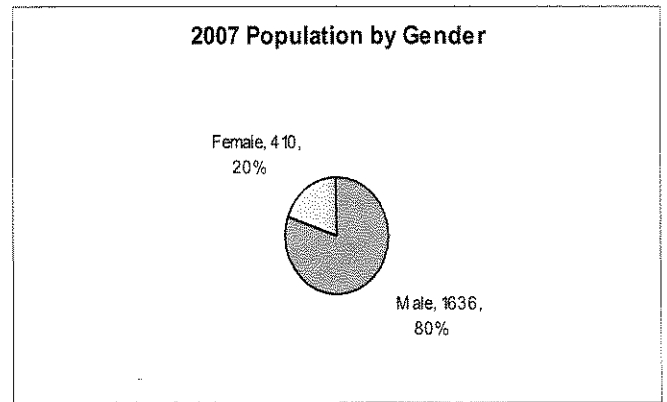
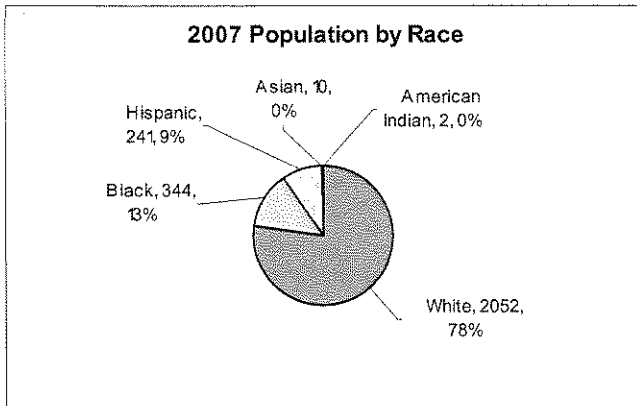


The population exceeded maximum bed space 184 days during 2007. When that happens, inmates are put on cots in the recreation area or in the day space in the cell blocks. When population continues to rise, we must send prisoners out to Putnam County to be housed.

Corrections



The above charts show population breakdown by race, gender, marital status and age. When taken in ten year age increments, the majority of the inmate population in the Hancock County Justice Center is single white males between the ages of 21 - 29.

The Justice Center runs many programs for inmates to participate in. Among them are mental health, alcoholism, educational, parenting, art, domestic violence, library, and religious programs. For a complete list of programs and participation statistics, please see Appendix D.

The Justice Center has a long running inmate worker program. This program allows inmates to be sent out with non-profit organizations and other government offices to do community service. In 2007, 2,187 inmate worker days were spent on 1,058 different work details. Inmates worked a total of 13,733 hours, providing community service work for various organizations. Some of the organizations using inmate workers include Findlay Street Department, Maple Grove Cemetery, Findlay Municipal Building, Board of Elections, Hancock County Fair Board, Hancock Park District, Hancock Historical Museum, and the Hancock County Agency on Aging. These organizations are given an opportunity to estimate the cost savings generated for them by using inmate workers. Not all organizations choose to calculate, but of those who do, an estimated savings of over \$121,500 was realized in 2007.

Rehabilitation & Opportunity Center

The Rehabilitation & Opportunity Center (ROC) is located at 7746 County Road 140, Suite C, in the top floor of the old County Home. The Center opened in 1999 as an alternative to jail. The ROC has the capacity to house seventy convicted, nonviolent male and female offenders.

Residents have the opportunity to serve their sentence at the ROC on a voluntary basis. There is a charge of \$25 per day. Typically those offenders convicted of misdemeanor and low level felony offenses are eligible to serve their sentence at the ROC. All offenders must first be screened and approved by the Director of the facility prior to serving their sentence.

The program has been organized to accomplish three specific goals: retribution, rehabilitation, and restitution.

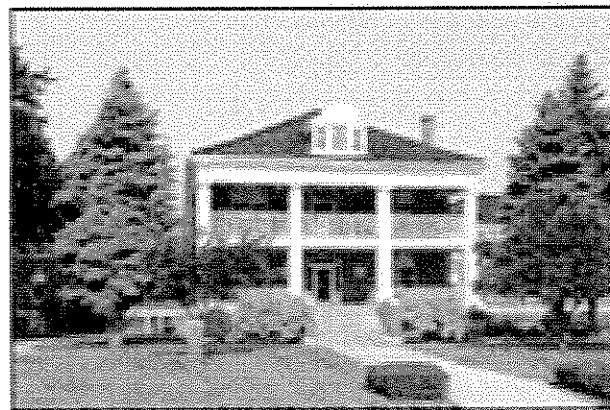
Retribution: Residents are not permitted the frills of extras such as cigarettes. Offenders are required to sign a contract that explains that failure to comply with the rules of the Center may result in being sent to the Hancock County Justice Center as well as losing all "credited time" from the Center. Upon admission and periodically throughout the program, offenders must undergo drug and alcohol testing.

Rehabilitation: Several Rehabilitative programs are offered to residents at the Center. Basic Literacy and GED classes are offered as needed. The center staff members assist in helping residents obtain employment. Those who are not employed complete various tasks within the facility and are available for community support at other government and non-profit agencies. Counseling assessments are provided by Century Health. The Center offers non-denominational religious services on Sundays and Bible study groups throughout the week when needed.

Restitution: Upon entrance into the facility, residents sign a contract requiring them to repay expenses incurred from their participation in the program. A payment plan based on the offender's ability to pay is then set up. Residents are required to pay for drug testing and all other medical expenses. Residents are encouraged to maintain their employment while in the program so that they can remain current with their financial obligations.

The ROC admitted 475 persons into the program in 2007, and released 455. The average daily population for 2007 was 27. The ROC billed residents \$227,823 and collected \$249,883. The City of Findlay paid the county \$154,102 for the use of the facilities for residents coming from Municipal Court on Codified Ordinances for the city, to cover utility and maintenance costs and indigent residents.

Special Units

The Hancock County Sheriff's Office has several special units. These units have been trained in specific areas and are able to provide specialized services when the need arises.

Crisis Intervention Team

Most of our officers have completed specialized training for crisis intervention. The training prepares the officer to deal with stressful, and often volatile, situations. It is an intensive week long training to educate our officers on how to deal with several types of individuals, including mental health individuals, and teach them how to deescalate situations before they become tragic. We held several training sessions in 2007, primarily for corrections officers. Our goal is to train all personnel, including corrections, in crisis intervention, especially as the jail population continues to increase with a larger number of mental health issues.

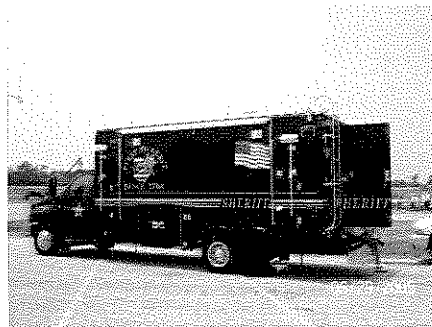


Emergency Response Team

The ERT team is used to execute high risk search warrants especially in any case involving suspected drug activity. The team can also provide special security details and can be used in the event of a disaster. This unit trains together every month to maintain their skills and enforce the unity and teamwork developed together in training. This team works closely with the Findlay Police Department ERT team, and they provide mutual aid for each other as needed.

Special Units—Volunteer Organizations

Special Deputy Organization

The Special Deputy Organization is comprised of citizens who are trained to assist law enforcement agencies. This organization is responsible for security at the county schools' football and basketball games and the Hancock County Fair. They also provide services for a variety of other special events around the county each year, including the craft fairs held at the fairgrounds.

The Special Deputy Organization provided security for 43 football games, 3 football playoff games, 78 basketball games, 12 tournament basketball games and provided manpower for 27 other details. The organization's volunteers provided 947.75 hours of security at the fair. The organization held 12 executive board meetings, 12 regular meetings and worked a total of 3,265.75 volunteer hours.

Posse

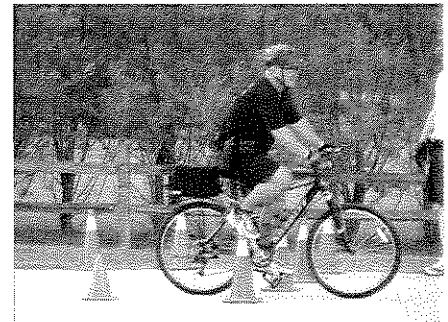
The Posse is a unit of the Special Deputy Organization and is utilized in parades and at the fair. The unit is also available for special duties which might arise where crowd control is an issue. Each certified posse member has had to undergo rigid training with their horse and pass tests to determine that they and their mount are qualified to handle themselves in stressful situations. These volunteers provide their own gear and mount, and participate in all training on their own time and money.

Underwater Search & Recovery Team

This unit is specially trained in underwater search and recovery, and have been utilized many times to search the reservoir, the Blanchard River, and area ponds and streams when the need arises. There are approximately 18 members on the team, including divers, boat crew, boat captain and the land crew.

Bike Patrol

The Bike Patrol has 6 members and provide services where cruisers cannot be utilized. They are also utilized for special events such as parades, 5k runs, and the Balloon Fest. This unit must go through training to learn how to handle their bicycles in all kinds of terrain and situations. Here are some photos taken during training sessions:

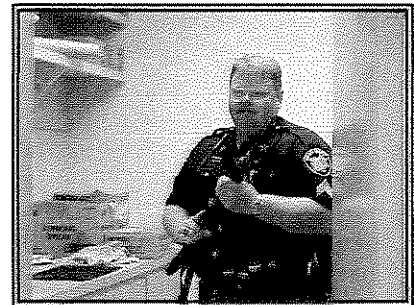
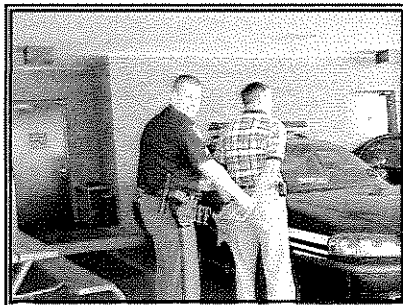
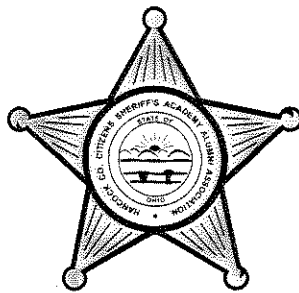
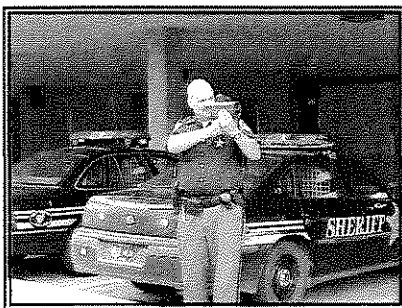


Hancock County Sheriff's Office Citizens Sheriff's Academy and Citizens Sheriff's Academy Alumni Association

The previous pages are basic information on the Special Units. If you would like to learn more about these units or any other areas of the organization, the Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the Citizens Sheriff's Academy Alumni Association, presents a Citizens Sheriff's Academy Class. The series of classes are designed to teach citizens of the county more about the inner workings and responsibilities of the Office of Sheriff.

The 16th Academy Class is scheduled for January of 2008. In the summer of 2007, we held our first Advanced Academy class. The alumni had requested to learn more and have more hands-on type of classes. The classes were limited to 12 students, and the students must have graduated from the basic academy class. The class ran 8 weeks, and had segments on communications, patrol ride-a-longs, simulated crime scenarios, active shooter training, and more. We held 2 classes and graduated a total of 22 from the Advanced Classes. We plan on having another Advanced Class in the summer of 2008. The Citizen's Academy has produced 134 alumni, and the alumni formed its own organization. The Citizens Sheriff's Academy Alumni Association provides volunteer work and organizes fundraisers for the Sheriff's Office. Volunteers help man a booth at the fair and assist in various other events throughout the year. The Association also holds a fundraiser annually to assist the office in equipment purchases that otherwise would not be possible. To date, the funds have been used for dive team equipment, to help pay for SIDNE (a go-cart that simulates impaired driving), computer upgrades, and more.

Total expenditures for the year 2007 were \$6,064,228 for the three components of the Sheriff's Office combined. Chart A shows the breakdown by area.

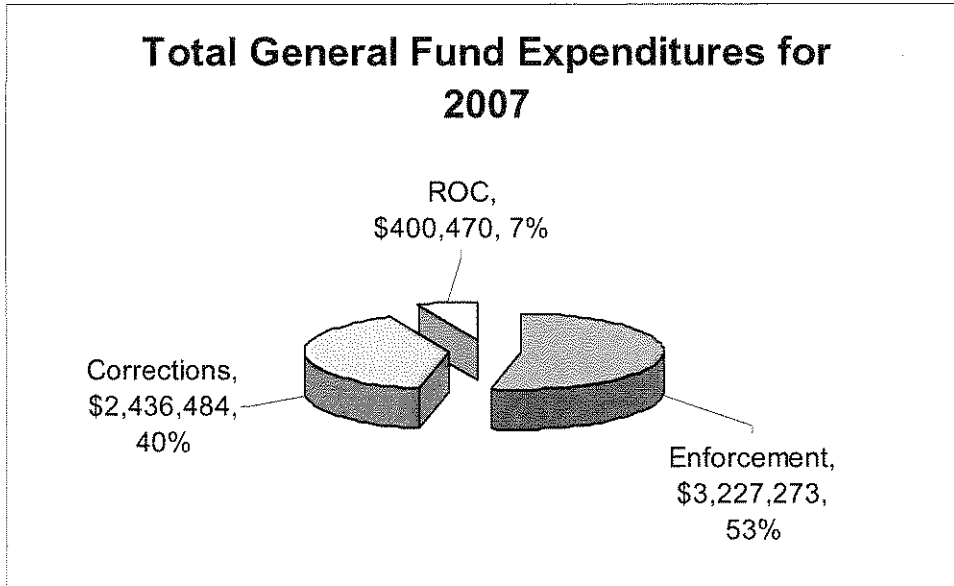

The Sheriff's Office generates income for services provided, inmate incarceration, and resident payments at the ROC. The Sheriff's Office deposited a total of \$1,264,042 into the General Fund in 2007. Chart B shows the amounts of income generated by each component of the Sheriff's Office.

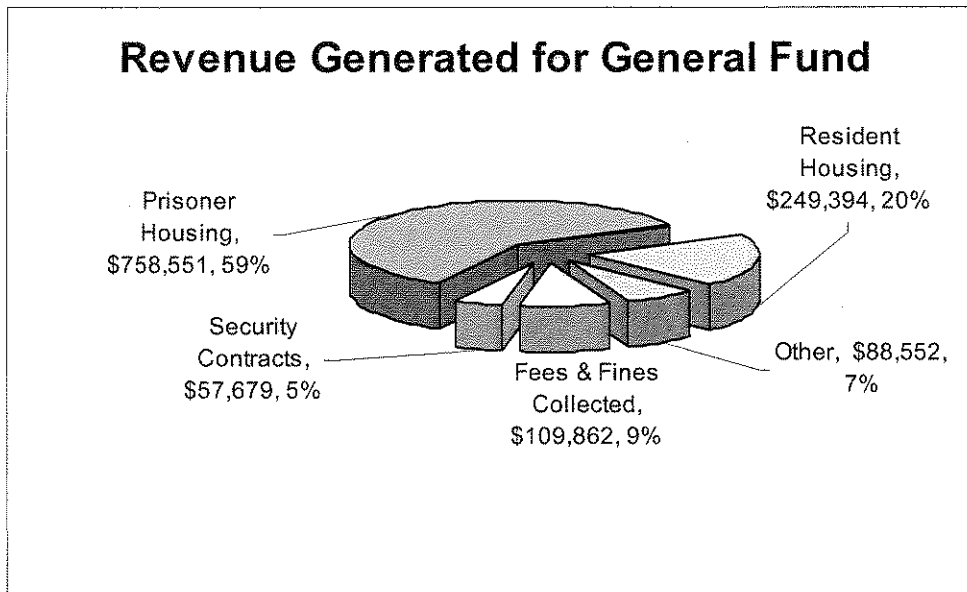
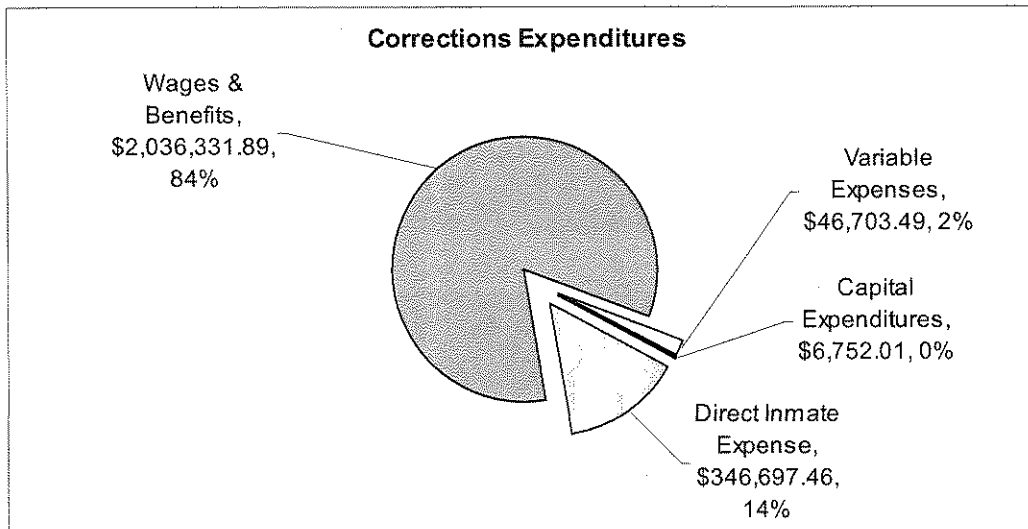
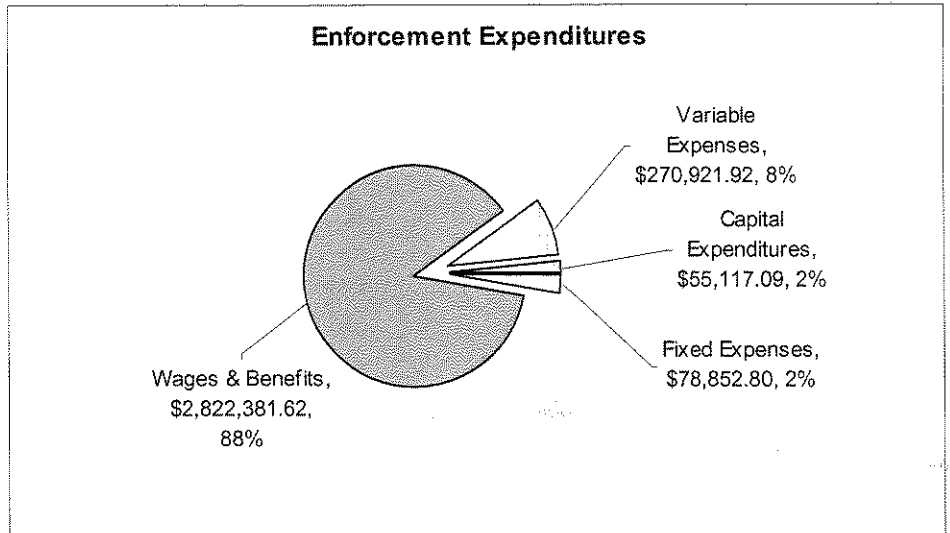

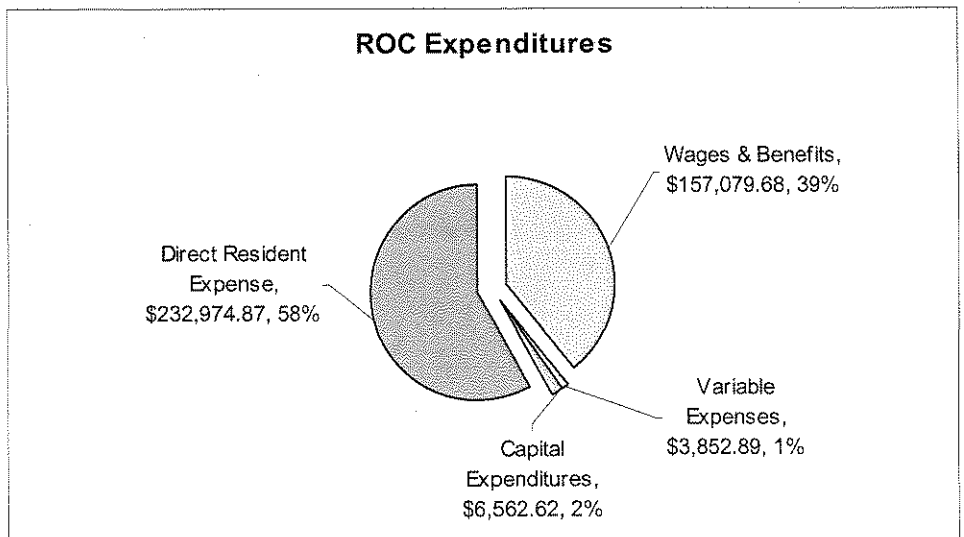

As you can see from the chart on the right, Wages & Benefits comprise 88% of the Enforcement budget. Variable expenses, including gasoline and repairs for cruisers, supplies and repairs, make up another 8%. Capital expenditures accounted for 2% and fixed expenses accounted for the final 2%. This chart illustrates the intense service aspect of the Enforcement component of the Sheriff's Office.



In Corrections, Wages & Benefits account for 84% of the total. Direct inmate expense (meals, medical expense, uniforms, etc.) make up another 14%, with the remaining 2% going for variable expenses. Capital expenditures came in at less than 1%. There is little room to reduce expenses in this area without reducing staff.

At the Rehabilitation & Opportunity Center, direct resident expenses make up 58% of the total. Direct resident expenses include meals and contracted security personnel. Wages and benefits contribute 39%, with capital expenditures at 2% and variable expenses at 1% of the total cost of the center.

As you can see, the expenditures have increased 17.23 % since 2002. This includes yearly contractual obligations for wage increases and health insurance increases. We have done our best to limit other expenditures, including minimizing capital expenditures. We did not purchase cruisers in any of the three years listed here.

The Hancock County Sheriff's Office is committed to providing the best services possible with the resources available. We are also committed to being accountable to the public for the money we spend. If at any time a citizen would like to inspect our financial records, we have an open door policy. The citizens of Hancock County are welcome at all times.

SPECIAL FUNDS

The Sheriff's Office has a number of special funds, stipulated by Ohio Revised Code, from which they receive and expend funds.

Drug Fines-The Office receives a small amount of monies from the courts through drug cases.

DUI Traffic Fines - The Office receives a small percentage of fines from DUI "Driving Under the Influence" traffic citations.

CCW Fund - This fund is used to deposit fees and pay costs for the Concealed Carry Weapons licensing procedures.

Metrich Drug Funds—The Office receives a portion of funds from the fines and restitution of Metrich operations that occur in Hancock County. The money is deposited in separate funds for special expenses and future use, should the drug task force disband.

Law Enforcement Trust Fund—Monies are received primarily through the sale of items confiscated during investigations.

Unlike General Fund accounts, the balances in special funds roll over from year to year, which allows the agency to accumulate funds for special expenditures (i.e., equipment, training, etc.)

GRANT FUNDING

The Sheriff's Office has been the recipient of many grants over the past years. We try to utilize these funds to help with projects we could not otherwise accomplish due to the budget constraints in the county.

In 2007, we applied and were granted an award for \$13,953 from the United States Department of Justice. This money is to be used for 3 mobile data terminals, and can be used over a four year period.

There are two grants which the Hancock County Sheriff's Office applies for and receives yearly. They are for bulletproof vests and overtime traffic enforcement.

The Bulletproof Vest Partnership, created by the Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant Act of 1998, is a unique United States Department of Justice initiative designed to provide a critical resource to state and local law enforcement. The estimated useful life of a bulletproof vest is 5 years. In 2007, the Hancock County Sheriff's Office received \$ 3,360 toward the cost of vests. This is generally 50% of the cost of the vests.

The overtime traffic enforcement grant is received from the Ohio Department of Public Safety. The grant covers the cost of overtime and benefits for deputies to be working strictly traffic enforcement during high traffic events such as proms, graduations, holidays, and community events. The focus of this program is to reduce injury crashes and fatalities by increased traffic enforcement. The project years run from October 1 through September 30. Our 2006-2007 grant totaled over \$23,000. In the fall of 2007, we received our award notice for the 2007-2008 year, which totaled \$25,289.

As described on page 11, the Zero Tolerance Task Force is also a grant funded program. The Greater Fostoria Community Foundation committed to a three year grant, which provides over \$54,000 per year for the salary and benefits for one deputy.

As of the end of 2007, we are awaiting a decision on a multi-county Regional Radio Project grant that has been applied for. This grant would allow several counties to update radio towers and to purchase MARCS radios, which are compatible with the state agencies and all other agencies who are on the system. We currently do not have the capability to communicate with other emergency agencies by radio. This would also boost our transmitting capabilities within the county, as we currently have problems with our radios being able to transmit from certain parts of the county, leaving our deputies without communication at times. We hope to hear a final decision on this grant in early 2008, at which time we will disseminate further information to the public.
